KINDERGARTEN 2014-2015 INFORMATION REGISTRATION



If you have a child who will be 5-years-old on or before September 1, 2014, he or she is eligible to be registered for Kindergarten during the 2014-2015 school year. A packet containing all necessary paperwork required for your child to begin Kindergarten in the fall may be picked-up at either Fort Zeller Elementary or Jackson Elementary School beginning the week of February 3-7, 2014 between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. daily. Or, if you prefer you may download the documents from the website. They can be found from the following location: District Information - Student Registration - Kindergarten Students.

It is requested that all forms be completed and returned to your respective elementary school office no later than April 7, 2014. We understand that some forms and appointments (dental and physical exams) may not be completed by this time, however, this date will allow ample time for processing of information prior to your child's kindergarten screening which will occur during the week of Monday, April 28 through Thursday, May 1, 2014. Please try to have as much paperwork completed as possible and necessary appointments scheduled! Upon returning the required paperwork, you will receive the date and time of your child's kindergarten screening.

ELCO HALL OF FAME

The Eastern Lebanon County School District Hall of Fame seeks to recognize individuals who have achieved noteworthy and outstanding accomplishments in their chosen fields and who will serve as role models for students currently enrolled in the ELCO School District. Individuals who are selected to the ELCO School District Hall of Fame are recognized at various events during ELCO's Homecoming activities in the fall of each year. Nomination forms and supporting documentation must be submitted to the High School office by **Thursday, May 15, 2014** in order to be considered for the 2014 Hall of Fame selection. After this date a selection committee, comprised of individuals representing the school community, will review all received nomination forms and the 2014 ELCO Hall of Fame inductee will be chosen.

SENIOR VOLUNTEER TAX PROGRAM

The ELCO School District will, again, offer an opportunity for retired senior citizen homeowners who are 60 years of age or older, to participate in the senior volunteer tax work-off program.

The program allows retired senior citizens to volunteer up to 76 hours at \$7.25 per hour, for a tax credit totaling a maximum of \$550. Participants may continue to volunteer after reaching 76 hours but will not receive tax credit for those hours. Tasks may include selling tickets at athletic events, tutoring children, assisting with drama productions, serving as an advisor to student groups, working as substitute custodians, or grounds keeping within the district.

A criminal history and child abuse background check is required for anyone working in a public school. The cost of the background checks is \$10 each for a total of \$20 per person.

Applications must be submitted annually and are available on the website by choosing the "*District Information*" link and "*Volunteering within the District*" or by contacting Tina Kunder at (717) 866-7117 ext. 2313.

Reminder: Applicants must submit a new application each year even if they were previously enrolled in the program.



As the winter season winds down, let's take note of what has been happening with the sports programs here at ELCO. We have approximately two hundred twenty students participating on our winter teams. All of these athletes are growing and learning through participation in athletics. The varsity activities we offer through the winter months are cheerleading, bowling, indoor track, wrestling, and basketball for girls and boys. We also offer wrestling, basketball, and cheerleading on the junior high level.

Cheerleading

ELCO's cheerleading squad can be seen and heard at the boys' basketball games. The squad consists of sixteen girls, of which eight are new to the sport. Lisa Liskey serves as the head coach.

Wrestling

The wrestling team should finish in second or third place in the section, this year. They placed second at the Delco Duals going 4-1 and won their own tournament in December going 6-0. Wes Bankus was named Game Time PA Athlete of the week in December going 11-0 in the two dual match tournaments over the holiday vacation.

Bowling

Bowling is having a great season under the direction of second year head coach Mike Rittle. The team is currently in second place behind a strong Northern Lebanon team. ELCO High School's FCCLA club (Family Career and Community Leaders) and Family and Consumer Science students recently volunteered their time for the 80th Anniversary Gala of the Lebanon County Community Concert Association. Fourteen students, Mrs. Wherley, and Mrs. Ocker assisted setting up, cleaning up, greeting patrons, and serving hors d'oeuvres to the 800+ attending the celebration held in Lebanon High School's new atrium. We can all be "ELCO Proud" of these students who worked tirelessly for six hours. Kathleen Hetrick, co-chair

for the Gala, praised them for their willingness to do whatever was asked of them, for asking insightful questions, giving good suggestions, and for making guests feel special through their interactions with them. Our students truly were great ambassadors of today's teens. A job so exceptionally well done can only be summed up in one way, "BRAVO"!!

STUDENTS WORK TO SAVE ENDANGERED TIGERS

For the majority of fourth graders, the most important animal in their day is the one they take for a walk or play with after school. But for a group of students in Kristi Fields' and Tara Perlaki's classes, tigers have taken over the top spot. These students are participating in the Albert M. Greenfield UNLESS contest, sponsored by the Philadelphia Zoo. The contest asks students to create a campaign to help save Sumatran tigers that are endangered by the loss of rainforest due to the harvesting of oil palm trees. The trio of Madion Almquist, Emma Fox, and Madelyn Strickler explain what this project is all about; "We are learning that palm oil is in a lot of lotions, shampoos, soaps and food. The people are



chopping down trees from the forest to get the palm oil and this is taking away the tigers' home and food. The tigers are eating dirt instead of food."

The Sumatran tigers are located nearly half a world away in Indonesia, but these students know that their work is important no matter how far their words need to travel. "The goal of our project is to stop companies from using deforestation to get palm oil," said Alec Hartzell. The ultimate goal of the contest is to use students' creativity to convince companies to change their plan of attack in securing the palm oil they need. The responsibility falls on the people who are buying the products, as well. Jaydon Grumbine shared, "People need to look for products that don't have palm oil in them, and get companies to use sustainable palm oil." Though adults are normally responsible for making decisions on what to buy, kids have learned that they have the power of persuasion and can use various ways to get their message across. "I've learned that many animals, like tigers, are dying because people are cutting down their home to make foods," said Rylan Brown.

Like most school projects, working together is at the heart of the assignment for this group. When asked about her favorite part of the project, Emma Fox adds, "I enjoy working with my friends to help save the tigers." The students have given plenty of effort, both individually and together as a group, even staying after school hours on select days to work! Through it all the focus has remained the same. Madelyn Strickler said the project is important because, "If we didn't save the tigers, they would be left without food and homes." For their efforts, students were able to participate in a Skype session with zoo representatives from Philadelphia. In April the winning contest projects will be announced in each age group. The students' project includes a video, which the students are working on with the help of Dave Hull on the music, lyrics, and editing. Mrs. Fields explains, "The students are creating a music video to share with our school, family and friends. Hopefully this will make people aware of the need to look for palm oil in the products they use everyday, and to encourage companies to get their palm oil without destroying forests in the process. Our students will help protect animals in other parts of the world. It's a message that the students are very passionate about sending to others."

As valuable lessons have been learned, these students will be able to look back and be proud of what they've accomplished, whether they are deemed contest winners or not. "In doing this project the students were able to work collaboratively for a cause and get close to the subject. All of these students started to look at their ingredients at home and realized how many products have palm oil. The students really gained a respect for the animals and the environment surrounding them." Mrs. Perlaki sums up the experience that these children will not soon forget. For the tigers' sake, we hope it's a message that companies and consumers will remember, as well.
